



- The high cost of meta-search
- The missing links...

One-stop shopping (almost): subject guides: an example





e-Journals, e-Books & Books

- 1. Most academic libraries have extensive e-journal collections: <u>UNB's</u>, for example
- 2. Most academic libraries also have significant e-book collections: <u>UNB's</u>, for example
- 3. And most academic libraries still buy print books too!

Student Group Exercise: Pre-Evaluation


Imagine you are writing a research paper related to the topic of *reading*. You have found many publications related to the topic, including the one in your hands....
