

her) in the River, that every effort to set her afloat proved fruitless, and despairing of a possibility, she can proceed to Annapolis, until an approaching Spring Tide gives more depth of Water, I have left an Officer, and some careful Sergeants to Watch (with a detachment of Men) the proceedings and navigation of the vessel and to conduct her (when practicable) to her first destination. It behoves me to mention also, that by my direction, an Enquiry has been held on the Conduct of the Navigating Officer and into the cause of this delay, the proceedings of this Court of Enquiry will be laid before you.

I have now Sir to report to you some circumstances respecting the state of the deposit of Fuel here, which has called for attention since my return hither.

I have already mentioned that I arrived here early on Thursday the 1<sup>st</sup> Instant, and on the morning of the 5<sup>th</sup> Mr. Johnson Assistant Com<sup>y</sup> General called on me with a very disagreeable Report of the state of the Coals already deposited in the Fuel yard. I will not here intrude a minute detail of circumstances, but beg leave to refer you Sir to the inclosed copy of Garrison Orders issued on the 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> Instant, in consequence of those circumstances.

I must add to the length of this letter in requesting you will be pleased also to peruse the inclosed copy of an official representation from the Assistant Commissary Gen<sup>y</sup> addressed to me, on the subject of reinforcing the detachment at the coal mines on Breton Island. — There is a representation of the same nature and substance, and to the same effect from Captain Henry Senior, Naval Officer at this Post. — Captain Henry's letter will also be laid before you; it contains a very urgent requisition for assistance to disembark a cargo

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I have the satisfaction to add that this morning the appearance of the land gives now no longer any reason of the fire being communicated either to the Wood or Buildings, how far we can congrue the general conjecture of the cause of the fire that can as yet be only temporarily smoothed, remains yet to doubt.

of Coals from five different transports now in Harbour: and anxiously wished to be dispatched in further service. — to this I conceived myself authorised to give a ready and cheerful Compliance. — as to the reinforcement required to the Coal mines, I shall wait until your pleasure is signified on that head, as strictly conforming to the instruction I received from you. — I flatter myself with a confident hope my conduct will merit and meet with your approbation. — I am much mortified to be rendered less active, by an unlucky hurt I received some days ago, in my left knee. — but I feel this inconveniences the less by being assiduously, and especially assisted by Major Lyons, whose zeal as a public Officer deserves my best acknowledgements. whilst I am writing, the Bonetta Sloop of War is entering the Harbour, I found the Vestal Frigate Captain Murray also arrived here since your departure, on my return hither from Windsor. I do not learn that either of those ships, have brought any intelligence worth mentioning to you.

A Vessel arrived yesterday from Newfoundland (that had passed thither from one of the continental states, but was not admitted to dispose of her cargo there). Her voyage from thence hither lasted ten days. — The Governor of Newfoundland (Admiral Campbell) was (at this vessel's departure thence) not yet arrived from Europe.

This letter will probably be delivered by Captain Munro (on his return to Canada) to whom I beg leave to refer for further information and have the honor to be with Respect, Esteem and Regards. Sir,
