Jonathan Allen & Matthew Mayhew
Esq^r. appeared in behalf of the
Inhabitants of Chilmark & cedar.
That they could not possibly comply
with ~~you~~ my requisition for cattle with-
out including all their working-oxen
& milch cows & thereby most materially
distressing themselves & effectually
impeding the collecting of fuel.

They affirm'd that the number of
oxen now fatten^g for provision did
not exceed in Chilmark more than
twentyfive, they also assure us of their
readiness to assist in cutting & car-
ting wood & doing every other service
within the limits of their ability.

In consideration of which I repeat
our resolution to avoid injuring ^{or}
them in any degree & relate to them
the particular information which I
had receive^d. That they were possess^d
of such stock — that they fear^d the
rebels would take it from them — &
and that they wou^d be glad of an
apology for selling them to us. —

We at last concluded that they
shou^d immediately employ all
their teams of laborers in the wood
service, & that they shou^d sell us
as many of their cattle & sheep as
they can spare without disturbing
their families. —

M^r. Smith who carried the letter
respecting Mr. Welsh, return^d with
a letter from Major Dimmick, Narragansett
stating thus. address^d.

" To the Commanding-Officer of the Fleet now in
the Vineyard Sound. Falmouth Sep: 10 1779.

I rec^r yours by Esq: Smith. M^r. Welsh
your purser who you mention in your letter
to the commanding officer at Falmouth was taken
by a party under my command. I think the
party did their duty & acted nothing inconsistent
with the honor of war, he has been treated with
honor since made a prisoner by us. I have sent
him to the commanding officer of the regiment who was not
present. I am not surprised at your threatening devastation
we had nothing to expect but devastation was your intent
considering your conduct last April.
