Pasamaguddy.

The next port or harbor is called Pasamaguddy, an indian name, and at its entrance is a large island granted to a number of gentlemen of Liverpool in Lancashire who gave it the name of Campobello, — they expended a considerable sum of money in order to form a settlement; but their endeavors failed for want of industrious people. There are on some other islands in this bay several settlements composed of people from Massachusetts Bay, who live by fishing and hunting. The river St Croix which runs into this harbor is the boundary of Nova Scotia. —

of the Bay of Fundy is called Argyle, where a few Scots and Acadians reside. — Next is Yarmouth, settled by New-England people. — Then Barrington — within the island call'd Cape Sable. This latter place is chiefly settled by Quakers from Nantucket. —

Plenty of fish and wild fowl along the whole coast of Nova Scotia, but the fishery especially may be carried on with success from St. Mary, & bay, eastward. — To the eastward of Cape Sable is Port Raisoir (so called by the French.) — It is a settlement begun by North Irish. — In Port Rosignol now called Liverpool, is a settlement chiefly by New-England people. —
