 one Family to 1000 acres.
 From that is a tract of un-
 granted Land extending
 near 6 miles, which, in some
 degree, is better in quality.
 Then comes that part of
 the Township of Amesbury
 fronting the River St. John's
 and extending on the river
 to the Washademoak. —
 The lower part, about Belle-
 Isle is tolerably good — plenty
 of good wood but not much
 timber. The upper part
 is chiefly burnt Land.

In the River, fronting this
 Township, are a number
 of Islands; the first a small
 one near Belle Isle of little
 consequence. The second is
 Spoon Island which is about
 1 mile long and very narrow;
 it contains about 50 acres,
 the Land excellent in quality
 and appertains to Amesbury.
 The 3^d is Long Island about
 4 1/2 miles in length and
 contains about 800 acres
 including a Sunken Meadow
 which extends almost the
 whole length of it. The
