

which is about 10 rods wide, about 3 miles you come to rapids which make difficult navigation. The land about the rapids for 3 miles is but indifferent, then begins good land on the western side, and there is an island near two miles in length which appears to be tolerable interval. From thence proceeding up 10 or 15 miles there are a number of islands exceeding good interval, and good interval alternately on both sides. Back of this the upland is generally high with

with a considerable quantity of good wood, something rocky but apparently capable of making pasture land. — Beyond that the land appears not so good. This river abounds with Salmon. The upper Islands are naturally clear and a large quantity of Hay may be cut (Blue joint & Foul Meadow). The upper part of Newton Township, on the River St. Johns, is tolerable good Land.
