

ack. There are 3 Islands in this River, the first 2 miles in length and one mile in breadth. The 2^d Pitchy Island, about $\frac{1}{3}$ as large as the first. Both of these are near Pannoyack. The 3^d is about 3 miles from Pannoyack, and is about half as large as Pitchy Island. The land on this River is generally good on both sides, until you come to a portage from this River to Madam Kewick, which is about 3 miles across and about 20 Leagues on this side Nashviack Lake. 3 Leagues from

from the Portage towards the Lake the land is bad. The remainder to the Lake is very good with much interval. — From St. Ann's to Anzac is about 6 miles — in this distance are a number of Islands particularly described in our remarks on Sunbury. Three & one half miles from Anzac is the river Madam Kewick on the east side St. John's river. — This river is nearly as wide as Nashviack and extends nearly as far into the Country. It has its source in the mountains. 25 Leagues from the mouth is a large branch
