§. 5. But as all these facts, if they could be supported by evidence, could have no other operation or effect, than to raise a presumption that the Commissioners in the year 1782, contemplated the Stouidie as the river St. Croix, & made it a part of the boundary described in the Treaty of Peace. Firstly Exhibit some facts & considerations, from which it may be fairly, and naturally concluded that the river Magaquadavie was by the said Commissioners, intended as The River St. Croix mentioned in the Treaty of Peace. — and

Secondly, will offer satisfactory proof, that the Magaquadavie, was the River truly intended in that Treaty under the name of the St. Croix.

§. 6. The idea of satisfactory proof on this point, seems to lay aside the necessity of such an investigation as is suggested in the first proposition; But yet, as this is a controversy very interesting to the peace and harmony of the two powers which are parties to it, nothing ought to be said which will tend to break that peace, or to disturb that harmony; nor anything left unsaid, which will promote objects so desirable in the eye of every good citizen, and every faithful subject.

Satisfactory Proof renders the proposed arguments unnecessary.
