§. 9. The Commissioners who form this honorable Board having been on the place in controversy - having seen the River claimed to, and having an accurate map of the country before them, must have anticipated these observations, viz.

First.

Passamaquoddy,
is between the
Bay of Fundy,
and the Rivers

That there is a Body of waters now called The Bay of Passamaquoddy, which is between the Bay of Fundy and the main Land northward, and which receives the two Rivers which are mentioned in the Claims of the two nations.

Secondly.

It
extends to
Oak-Bay

That this Bay extends as a Bay, several miles on a north course, above a place called The Devils Head; and nearly eight leagues from the Bay of Fundy, as now known, and there ends in a Body of waters called Oak-Bay.

Thirdly.

That a small navigable River, whereon Scoudiac River small vessels may be borne, at, or near high-water, is extended by a flowing-tide west about seven miles, from the west side of this Bay; where it receives the fresh water issuing from Scoudiac River, at what is now called Scoudiac Falls.

Fourthly.

That on the northeasterly side of the Bay, there is a river which the native Indians in their language call The Magaquadavie, into which, vessels of very large dimensions, may enter, and find a secure harbour at any time of tide, and on which river, at or near high-water, Loaded Vessels of a considerable size, may be carried to a place at the foot of a great & remarkable Fall of fresh water, about five miles from the Bay of Passamaquoddy.
