

On the 22^d took the northern branch, and, after rowing eleven miles, came to the second Falls where the water fell almost perpendicular. The river above the second Falls, appeared to be very rapid as far up as we could see. The next day went back to our quarters.

On the 30th of June, after finishing the survey, embarked on board Capt. McKown for Boston. and I further say that I was twice up to the western river Falls, which river I never heard called by any other name but Schudic. But the eastern river where the Indians went with us, I often heard it called Macadavia. — And further saith not
