

agreed that as soon as may be after the decision of the said Commissioners, measures shall be concerted between the Government of the United States, and his Britannic Majesty's Governors or Lieutenant Governors in America in order to erect and keep in repair a suitable monument at the place ascertained & described to be the said river Saint Croix, which measures shall immediately thereupon, and as often afterwards as may be requisite be duly executed on both sides with punctuality and good faith.

This explanatory article, when the same shall have been ratified by his Majesty, and by the President of the United States by & with the advice & consent of their Senate, and the respective ratifications mutually exchanged, shall be added to and make a part of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce & Navigation between his Majesty and the United States, signed at London on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of November 1794, and shall be permanently binding upon his Majesty & the United States.

In witness whereof, we the said Undersigned Plenipotentiaries of his Britannic Majesty & the United States of America have signed this present article, & have caused to be affixed thereto the seal of our Arms.

The river claimed by the United States, & called by the Natives the Magaquadovic, admits of no controversy as to its source, and the undersigned Agent, from a fair and candid consideration of the evidence, feeling himself assured that the Commissioners can never declare the Scoodiac to be the river Saint Croix, truly intended by the name of the river Saint Croix in the Treaty of Peace, He will not add any thing on the question of what is the source of the river intended in the Treaty. The former arguments, the ancient & modern plans, designate the relation between the source, and the mouth of the rivers intended.
