Taking it for granted then, that by the  
second article of the Treaty of Peace it was  
intended that no part of the Province of  
Nova Scotia should be thereby ceded by His  
Majesty to the United States, but that the  
Province of Nova Scotia, according to its an-  
cient ~~undisputed~~ limits, should be & remain (10)  
a part of the territories and dominions of His  
Majesty, as His Majesty then, & before that  
time had, held & possessed the same, the  
object of our inquiries will simply be what

the western boundaries of that Province;
