therefrom — also of a small rocky Island
called Gull Island, lying contiguous to
the other, also of one other small island to
the westward of the Gull Island commonly
called & known by the name of Casco-Bay
Island. possession is still held under this Grant.

12. A grant in the year 1774 to Thomas
Harrel of 2000 Acres, upon the Diggedegwash
River, lying between the rivers Scoudiac &
magaguadavic.

A Plan of these Grants is now before the
Board

During the same period there were granted
under the seal of the Province of Nova Scotia
many Townships and large tracts of land on
the north side of the Bay of Fundy, exclu-
sive of those above specified; — Most of these
Grants were escheated for non-performance
of the Conditions upon which they were held,
and the lands have since been ^{re}granted by
the Crown to others.

Thus it appears that a great proportion
of the land near the shores of the Bay be-
tween the Rivers Scoudiac or St. Croix & maga-
guadavic and all the Islands in the Bay
of any considerable magnitude or consequence

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were, ^{not only} ~~mainly~~ (with the other Islands in the Bay,
and the residue of the land between those rivers) ^{not only}
within the limits of the Province of Nova Scotia,
but were actually granted, under the seal
of that Province, by the Crown, before the
year 1775. /1511

In addition to this Evidence the under
written Agent is prepared to establish the
following facts by witnesses to be produced
before this Honorable Board.

That from the year 1770 to the year
1775 Courts of General Sessions of the Peace
were held by Commission from His Majesty
under the authority of the Government of
Nova Scotia, upon the Island of Campo Bello
and that the docketts & records of that Court
were, with several other books and papers,
taken from the possession of a magistrate
there, then having custody of the same,
by an American Privateer in the year
1778; That while these Courts were held
on Campo Bello Island, during the period
above mentioned, Moose Island, Deer
Island, Indian Island and all the other
Islands ~~now~~ in the Bay of Capimaguady
were within the jurisdiction of the Province
of Nova Scotia. — That not only all the
