

We come now to the testimony of the
Indians, produced sworn and examined as
Witnesses on the part of the United States
before this Honorable Board at their Session
at S^t. Andrews; which materially supports
the grounds of His Majesty's Claims.

The substance of it is. - That the Indians
call the Magaguadavic S^t. Croix. - That the
French gave it that name; - That the Indians
call the waters upwards from Brewer's [a place
as before observed, nearly opposite the northern
point of S^t. Andrews harbor] by the name of
Scoudiac; - That the Bay below is called Capi
maguady; - That there is no river called Capi
maguady; - That the first Cross was put up
at the Magaguadavic, and two days after
a Cross was put up at S^t. Andrews Point,
near the entrance of the mouth of the Scoudiac,
called by the Commissioners in the foregoing report, made
in October 1784, the Eastern bank of the River Scoudiac
by S^t. Andre a Priest, from whence it was called
S^t. Andrews, which Cross was renewed by the
Priests, as it became rotten, and was standing
about fourteen years ago; - That they never
heard the Scoudiac called S^t. Croix; - That they
have seen a Cross which was erected, upon the
Scoudiac at the carrying place. That all the
Lakes upon the western branch of this river
shown them upon the Plans, extending near

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
