

cross wise from the Eastward being but an in-
considerable stream, and there being only
one other similar stream coming from the
northward into Cape point Bay.

134/ In searching for the Ile St Croix with L^e
carbot's description in his hand, would any
man doubt that here was a successful ter-
mination of his labours, would he not have
exclaimed, I will go no further.

The foregoing sketch of the route from
Saint John to the Ile and River St
Croix is made from observations made
frequent passages by water along the coast
between those two places they are with con-
fidence warranted to be correct, if there are
any misrepresentations, they are as easily
to be detected.

On this point it is a matter of consequence
that the undersigned Agent requests to be in-
dulged with transcribing in this place
the description of the same route, from
Champlain who as we have seen accom-
panied the Sieur De Monts at the time the
Ile and River St Croix received their names.

The foregoing sketch of the route from St John's River
to the Ile and River Saint Croix, will be seen to be
correct by an inspection of the map now before
the Board; and it will admit of no doubt, that
this Island in the mouth of the river Scoudiac
is the Ile St Croix mentioned by L^e Escarbot, when
we attend to the delineation of the River St Croix, in
the map annexed to his History now before the
Board a copy of which is herewith presented.
In this map, only one river is laid down be-
tween the River St John and the River Noram
bega or Pensbecot, and is marked Sainte Croix;
in this river the Ile St Croix and the smaller
Island near the western shore are laid down
exactly in the relative situation in which we
find the Islands in the mouth of the Scoudiac
to be placed, and in the northern quarter we
see the sharp pointed Hill laid down, answer-
ing the position, in which was found the Devil's
or D^e Brille's head is found to lie.

In addition to the foregoing remarks upon
L^e Escarbot's map, it is proper to observe here 135/

1. That only one river was at that day
